Difference Between "Some" And "Any"

"SOME" IS USED IN POSITIVE STATEMENTS. "ANY" IS USED IN NEGATIVE STATEMENTS AND QUESTIONS:

- I want some bread
- I don't want any bread.
- Do we have any bread in the house?

EXCEPTION TO THE RULE:

"Some" can be used in questions if you are **offering** something to someone, or **asking** for something:

- Would you like some bread?
- Can I have some extra ketchup for my fries, please?

ONLY USE "SOME" AND "ANY" WITH UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS AND PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS:

- She wants some water. (water = uncountable noun)
- He hasn't received any e-mails yet. (e-mails = plural countable noun)

DON'T USE "SOME" OR "ANY" WITH SINGULAR COUNTABLE NOUNS:

- Can I have some apple? (apple = singular countable noun) Can I have an apple?
- Paul doesn't have any car. (car = singular countable noun)
 Paul doesn't have a car.
